




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

#### **Dear Editor**

After the Huby Parish council bye election, the community voted to go for the Localism Neighbourhood Plan, and maintain the Huby War Memorial hall. One resident, especially delighted with the news was Roy Muir. Roy was one of the founder members of the War Memorial Hall.

In 1944 Roy set up the very first Amdrams in Huby. At that time Huby did not have its own village hall, so Roy would take his Huby Amdram Musical Society to other village halls as far afield as Hutton le Hole, Farndale and Filey to stage his productions.

When the committee was offered the school room from Linton on Ouse RAF camp, they jumped at the chance to form Huby's own War Memorial Hall. The day the schoolroom arrived amid great excitement, the community joined in to set up their very own village hall. Those were the days of community spirit, when the village hall was the heart of the universe.

The front of the building was built with everyone buying a brick at a cost of half a crown or 2/6d, in todays money 30p. Many happy times were held in the War Memorial hall. News spread, about the popular live dance bands, at Huby Village Hall and over the years people came from far and wide. Every week three coach parties of young people would arrive from York to dance at the Huby Village Hall. Members of the community still reminisce about their 'courting' days at the War Memorial hall dance, this is where they met and married the love of their lives.

All the time Roy was on the village hall committee, he never stopped working to raise money to pay off the loan for the War Memorial hall, travelling with his Amdrams, staging concert parties to all the far away villages. This is only one of the many admirable things Roy did for the village, he was on the Parish Council for 53 years, yes 53 years, what an achievement, for that alone he deserves an OBE. Can anyone living beat that record? Roy was a school governor for ten years, a churchwarden for 29 years. He also served on the street lighting committee, all these activities he carried out while working full time as a farm worker at Mills Farm, Tollerton, where he met and married his soulmate Mary, who was working in the Land Army at the same farm.

Roy and his wife Mary now live in a cosy bungalow in the heart of the village a very knowledgeable and interesting couple to talk with. Roy has certainly done more than his bit for the Huby Village community, a real honour to know him.

Thank you Roy Muir, enjoy your retirement, knowing your War Memorial Hall is appreciated by all.

Well at last it would appear some much needed decent weather has arrived! This I hope will brighten up the "spirit" in our village! For those who are interested, the NHG (New Hall Group) planning appeal will be heard on the 23<sup>rd</sup> July in Northallerton. It looks likely that this process will take 2 days to complete. The Parish Council and **Hambleton District Council** planning department continue to object to both of the proposals. Whatever the outcome, it will be good to get a clear direction on which way the village structure will take. At the end of the long process it will be so important to come together and embrace the decision of the planning officer. Am delighted to report that the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group is moving forward at a great pace. They are building a new website which will keep you up to date with developments and the progress they are making, the details of their work will also be printed and circulated for all to see. Anybody with any bright ideas, do make a point of contacting the

group. Consultation and participation from the entire village is most welcome by all members of the group. Meanwhile, the group continue to report back to and update the parish council on a regular basis. You might have recently seen 'electronic speed matrix loggers' around the village! I contacted the police to complain about excessive speeding in the village and readings of excess speed were recorded at ALL of the sites, which is very worrying. Two areas of the village in particular were above what is deemed acceptable within a 30mph speed limit. In the next few weeks two permanent flashing speed matrix indictors will be installed, one in Tollerton road at the entrance to the village from the A19 and the second in Easingwold Road (outside of Period Pine Doors). The signs will act as a visible warning and an educational message to motorists. I don't think it's a bad thing for all residents to keep an eye on their speed when driving around the village, it is easy to relax on roads you are familiar with and for speed to creep

upwards. Please feel free to pass on this message to those who perhaps don't read this news letter!

We were recently asked to look into the situation around dropped kerbs along Easingwold Road. It was highlighted that it was difficult for disabled people to use the footpaths and cross the road in certain areas of the village. It would appear that some funding may be available from North Yorkshire County Council which is great news. We are just waiting to hear back from Jane Charlton at NYCC Highways to see what the level of funding will be. The election for Chairman and Vice Chair for the Parish Council was held at the AGM. I am pleased that I was voted to stand as Chair and Guy Redfern as vice chair, both unanimously. I and the other PCs will continue to do our best to



# "TELL US YOUR VIEWS" URGES PARISH COUNCIL AS IT STARTS NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

#### Plan1

VILLAGERS in Huby have a major chance to help shape the future of their community.

Everyone who lives or works in the village is being invited to help Huby Parish Council become one of the first in the area to create a Neighbourhood Plan which will eventually be submitted to Hambleton District Council.

Once submitted, the Neighbourhood Plan will become an official planning document to guide economic development, infrastructure, open spaces, job creation, services and planning for the next 15 years.

The parish council has asked a group of volunteers, drawn from a cross-section of villagers, to help develop the plan which it wants to complete by the end of the year. It will then be agreed by a community referendum and submitted to Hambleton District Council by 2014.

Cllr Mike Pannett, Chairman of Huby Parish Parish Council says that, in canvassing the views of villagers, the Parish Council is pledging to be:

- Inclusive giving everyone living, or working, in Huby a chance to take part.
- Comprehensive identifying all aspects of village life which need to be included.
- Positive creating a plan to enhance quality of life.
- Open with the whole community having access at every stage.
- Impartial the Huby plan will be forward-looking, engaging and exciting.

#### Plan2

Richard Todd, Working Party
Chairman added: "This is a
fantastic opportunity for Huby
people to decide what they want
the future to be like and to guide
the thinking of Hambleton District
Council when it considers
development applications and
wider issues which affect the
village.

"However, this is a community project and, to make the best of this important opportunity, we need everyone, however limited their experience or views, to tell us what opportunities and challenges they believe lie ahead, what they are concerned about and what they would like to see happen.

"Their ideas or concerns could be about any aspect of Huby life including community facilities, leisure opportunities, environmental issues or local employment prospects.

"We will engage and listen to everyone as it is vital that we get this right to serve the best interests of all those who live or work in the village or may wish to do so in the years to come."

Villagers who want more information on canvassing views for the Neighbourhood Plan or to know when relevant meetings are, should watch the village notice boards or contact their local parish councilor.

Local communities have been able to create their own Neighbourhood Plans for future growth, development and amenities since 2012 under the Government's Localism Act 2011 and many throughout the UK are taking up the challenge.

# **Community Website for Easingwold and villages**

- Local churches (work in progress, but I am reliant on receiving information from parishes – including Sutton and Huby)
- Website links to every cinema and theatre in our wider area (that means from Richmond to Hull, Scarborough to Bradford)
   perfect if you want to find out what's on quickly!
- A list of downloadable bus timetables for the Easingwold & Villages area – that's Reliance and Stephenson's plus others, including the Moors bus and Dales Bus from Easingwold
- A short history of Easingwold and short summaries of all the parishes in our area (any submissions would be gratefully received!)
- And many other items too numerous to mention.
