
HUBY VILLAGE WALKS No 1 HAVERBRAKES LANE

DISTANCE/TIME: $1 - 1\frac{1}{2}$ miles: 30 - 45 minutes

TERRAIN: Farm tracks and pavement. Track can be muddy in wet weather.

- 1. With your back to the village shop turn right and turn right again immediately down Robin Lane. The tarmac with road calming humps becomes a track. Walk past the sports pavilion and children's playground. Ignore the track at the far end of the playground.
- 2. Turn right at the next junction following the blue way mark. This is Haverbrakes Lane which passes through one of the medieval open fields: West Field. 'Haver' is the old word for oats. After about 200 metres ignore a stile into a field on the right. The track follows a dog-leg bend and eventually turns sharp right bringing you out onto Easingwold Road.
- 3. Turn right. You can follow this road back to the shop or take a slightly longer route back at point 4.

- 4. Turn left into Shaw Crescent and follow it to the end.
- 5. Turn right and follow the track called North Carrs Lane, through Tally Hill (Common Land) down to Stillington Road.
- 6. Turn right and walk to the junction.
- 7. Turn left and follow Main Street back to the shop.

FASCINATING FACTS

Huby's name means 'farmstead on a spur of land', an 8th/10th century Danish name. You can see houses in Main Street have been built on a small ridge.

Haverbrakes Lane goes through West Field, one of the largest of the medieval open fields. 'Haver' means oats, which was the main crop to grow for flour. To the right of the lane, you can see 'ridge and furrow' in the field, showing the strips of land people farmed.

Cabin Lands, to the left on the junction of Robin Lane and Haverbrakes, was where villagers decamped during the plague, possibly of 1625-6, to escape it.

Shaw Crescent is named for Mrs Adela Shaw of Burn Hall who donated the land for the Memorial Hall to the village in 1950.

North Carrs Lane leads to a large area called North Carrs. 'Carr' means a marshy area with ponds.

You pass through Tally Hill, an expanse of common land, when you walk down North Carrs Lane. The origin of the name Tally Hill is as yet unknown...

Main Street houses are mainly 18th and 19th century, built with handmade bricks, and with pantile roofs replacing earlier thatch.
