Defibrillator training occurred in December and the device is on the wall of the Mended Drum and now live. If you haven't had training, then accessing the device is still possible and it's important of course you call the emergency services and they can guide you. For future reference the access Code is C159X and is now on the information panel at the back of the Voice (if you call 999 they can also give you this so don't worry!)

News from Huby Methodist Church

As I write this, I realise how quickly the New Year is gathering speed. Today we have enjoyed tossing pancakes and tomorrow, Ash Wednesday, marks the beginning of Lent and we are looking towards Easter.

One of our services earlier in the year was our Covenant Service, shared with our friends from All Hallows, led by our Minister, Revd Elizabeth Cushion, which was a wonderful beginning and preparation for the New Year.

As Easter approaches we shall be delighted to welcome everyone to Huby Methodist Church.

Easter Services. Good Friday, 30th March. Join us for a Walk of Witness and help us to carry the cross from Huby to Sutton, leaving Huby at 1.30pm. A service of reflection will follow at All Hallows Church, Sutton on the Forest.

Easter Sunday. 1st April at 10.30am. Holy Communion led by Revd. M Chester,

Looking well ahead to Sunday, 11th November, Armistice Day will be an especially important day of remembrance as it is the 100th anniversary of the end of the First World War. At Huby we are having a special service on Friday, 9th November for the older children from Huby Primary School, with another service on Remembrance Sunday itself. We are hoping to decorate the building with poppies, knitted, crocheted, or made of other materials.

Here is a pattern which you may wish to use for knitted poppies or the British Legion website has several patterns for all types of poppies.

Poppy Pattern

Red and black wool 3.5 mm/size 9 needles

Body of poppy:

Using red wool, cast on 120 stitches

Rows 1-4 knit

Row 5 knit 3 stitches together across the row (40 stitches)

Rows 6-9 knit

Row 10 knit 2 stitches together across the row (20 stitches)

Rows 11-14 knit

Row 15 knit 2 stitches together across the row (10 stitches)

Cut wool leaving a tail of about 20cm

Thread tail through a needle and slip all the remaining stitches onto it and pull tight.

Pull around into a circle and stitch to seam.

Sew in ends.

Centre of poppy:

Using black wool cast on 16 stitches

Cast off

Coil into a tight spiral and sew to base.

We shall be most grateful for your help in this and have given lots of advance warning so that you can get out your knitting needles! Finished articles can be give to Church Stewards or any other members of our congregation. (Details below).

In the early hours of 14 February

(12.30ish), 4 youths broke into the shop by smashing the door glass. The alarm activated and they fled without taking anything. The police have taken copies of the CCTV from outside and inside the shop. We hope it isn't anyone from the village. Volunteers had to clean up the shop – glass was everywhere - and temporarily board the door before we could re-open. Inevitably, insurance and security costs will rise because of the thoughtless actions of a few. Our shop and post

office are monitored 24/7 by a security company, and the management committee is contacted immediately the alarm is activated.

On a

more positive note, we were delighted to win the Best Community Co-Operative award in London last December, organized by the Plunkett Foundation. Two of our volunteers - Hilary Dangerfield and Hilary Kilner - represented Barkers and accepted the award on behalf of all our wonderful volunteers, customers and supporters. Part of our award was a cheque for £250 for a volunteers party which will be used for a wine-tasting and party in early March. Barkers is also a finalist in the Community Awards organized by Hambleton District Council, to be held at the end of March.

We hosted another study visit from a community group hoping to set up a community shop in Cheshire, and Denise and Terry visited Clapham Village Store in December to see how they run their community shop. Your Management Committee is always seeking ways to improve the shop and post office and meeting other people running community shops is helpful.

Barkers is approaching the end of our 3rd year of trading as a community owned shop and we will be able to repay some bonds in April. Last April, we repaid nearly £12,000 in bonds, many of you waived interest, and £4250 was kindly converted into donations. The Management Committee hopes to be able to repay half of the remaining £25,000 or so in bonds, this April. If you are a bondholder and would like your bond repaying, please email hubyandsuttonshop@outlook.com and we'll let you know what we can do.

Next time you come into the shop, take a good look round at what we sell. We don't charge more than the RRP and some products like Yorkshire Butter are cheaper than Tesco's! Currently £1.75 at Barkers, to £1.90 in Tesco. And you'll often find frozen meat from Hartleys and fish from Hodgsons with 10% discount in the freezers.



The children were inspired by the afternoon and this was followed up by our own engineering afternoon where every child helped to build their own Great Tower of Huby. The afternoon was organised by children in Year 5 as part of their Diocese of York Young Leaders Award and the afternoon was superbly led and judged by Edith Slater in Year 5 who was voted by her peers to lead the afternoon. 
Tuesday 17 April: Mustang

Huby Amateur Dramatics and Musical Society Pantomime 'Sleeping Beauty' 2018

Thank you to everyone who participated in and came to watch 'Sleeping Beauty' at Huby Memorial Village Hall, the 74th consecutive year of productions which we think is a record, certainly in Yorkshire, so as you can imagine we are already in the early stage planning the 75th Anniversary production.

A fabulous cast of 27 adults and mainly juniors rehearsed with Directors Sandie Tanner-Smith and John Hawker and Choreographer, Poppy Moore, for 5 months with to bring the Panto to life, led by the irrepressible Paul'Elvis' Moore once more playing our Dame. This year Paul played the Royal Nursemaid, Lucy Lastic to the infant Princess Aurora, in the Kingdom of Ambrosia, run by hen pecked King Timorous 13th (Rory Vince) and his bombastic wife, Queen Bossanova (Michelle Moore) not forgetting a very snobbish Lord Chamberlain (Bradley Moore), Jack theCourt Jester(John Hawker) who tells terrible jokes, his girlfriend, the rather forward, Merlot(Amanda Moore) and the ever vigilant Palace guards(Oliver Lawery, Ollie Marshall, Harvey Moore,Oscar and Charlie Wilkinsonj

The show opens with Aurora's Christening, kind and beautiful spells are cast by the Amethyst, Ruby, Emerald, Topaz and Sapphire Fairies(Amelia Lawery, Georgia Foster, Ruby Adams, Rebecca Border and Morgan Adams) however, there is one Fairy who hasn't been invited - The Charcoal Fairy(Robert Thompson) who storms in with his Evil sidekicks, Morticia(Rebecca Beaumont) and Cruella(Izzy Blacker), he curses the infant princess, saying she will die at 17 by pricking her finger on a spindle from a spinning wheel. Disaster!

But here comes The Diamond Fairy (Poppy Moore), she has yet to cast her spell and though she can't undo the spell she can lessen the effect; Aurora won't die but will fall asleep until her true love awakens her with a kiss, awwww.

love and plan to meet in a week's time however Aurora is lured to a hidden room in a turret of the castle where the Charcoal Fairy encourage her to try the Spinning Wheel and, yes, you've guessed it, she pricks her finger and falls into a deep sleep. The Diamond Fairy and her fairies send the court to sleep singing 'Mr Sandman' whilst a terrible forest grows to enclose the castle and those asleep in it.

Luckily the Diamond Fairy had sent Lucy Lastic, Merlot and Jack to Bohemia to fetch Prince Rupert and Frederick and on their return, they found Edward, a little lost bear (Oscar Wilkinson) who'd lost his family when the forest of thorns grew so they set out to find them and rescue the Princess. Along the way they meet the Ye Olde Pie Seller (Oliver Lawery) who sells them custard pies – which end up in their faces, then his identical brother manages to fleece them of all of their money selling them cloths to wipe up the custard!

Unfortunately, Rupert announces that their swords won't cut through the thorns and more grow back bigger and stronger 'Oh what are they going to do!' Cue the Diamond Fairy who awards Lucy, Merlot and Jack them special T.W.I.T (Team Work is Terrific) medals for their effort and Rupert and Frederick Magic Swords(cunningly disguised at Light Sabers) which demolish the forest and reveal the rest of Bear family(Georgia Foster and Olivia Piercy) however a Very Angry Caterpillar (Flo & Ollie Marshall, Ellie Jackson, Oliver Lawery and Charlie Wilkinson's has been summoned to attack everyone and a furious fight ensues before it is vanquished by Prince Rupert and Frederick. Finally the way to the palace is cleared but not before a very naughty skeleton (Harvey Moore) tries to scare Lucy, Jack and Merlot away then the sleeping court is awakened.

Just as Prince Rupert declares his love for Aurora, the Charcoal Fairy bursts in and freezes Rupert but King Timorous seizes the day and snatches the wand from the evil Fairy, with this he gains his courage and 'melts' the Charcoal Fairy before telling his beloved but bossy wife, the Queen, in the nicest possible way, to 'Shut up' everyone is reconciled, and a grand wedding takes place.




