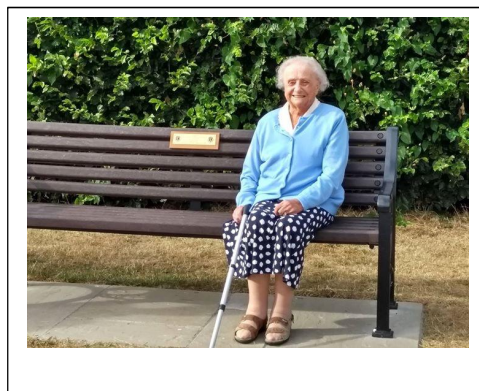

Recently the Easingwold District Lions Club kindly donated a bench to the village at the intersection of Stillington Road and the Main Street. This is in memory of Jim Coates, a resident of the village who sadly died last year. Jim was known to many parishioners and was a dedicated and longstanding member of Easingwold Lions and Huby Amdrams. The bench was formally handed over to the village on 20 July and members of the Parish Council, the Lions (including President Di Watkins) and members of Jim's family, including his widow Jean, daughter Jane were present. Jim and Jean have been residents of the village for 50 years and the 20 July would have been his 95th birthday. In the pictures Jean is accompanied by her daughter Jane with husband David, granddaughter Helen with Martin, Grandson Paddy with Rachael. Two of their three great grandchildren, Isabel and Rory were also present (Bethany was at Guide camp)

The following is an extract from an email we received last night from the victim of an incident on Carr Lane, Sutton on the Forest last Sunday. If anyone has any information that can help identify the occupants of the car, or witnessed the cyclist at some point, please get in touch so we can pass on your details to the individual concerned.

"On the Sunday 5 August at approximately 4pm I came off my push bike in Carr Lane Sutton on the Forest and received concussion and didn't regain consciousness until three hours later whilst I was in A&E. I had to receive 20 stitches to my forehead and spent Sunday night in hospital under observation.

I wondered if anyone witnessed the accident as it all seems very strange.

The accident happened approximately half way between the Gowans and the turning to Sheriff Hutton.

I am not sure what happened as I was concussed but I would like to trace the owner of a black estate car with three occupants (two men and a woman) who brought me home and then left very suddenly and suspiciously. One of our neighbours thought they knew one of the people in the car and waved to them and that person then put his hand in front of his face to presumably to shield himself.

I would very much like to speak to anyone who witnessed these events."

We try and contact as many shareholders by email as possible, and put notices up in Huby and Sutton, so do please try and come and support the work of the volunteers, post office staff and management committee. Elections for the management committee will be held at the AGM. We have over 50 volunteers now, serving in one role or another, to keep Barkers open and successful. New volunteers this summer include Lin Griffin from Sutton, and Jayne Johnson and Sandy Steel from Huby. To help with rota planning, we now use an online rota management system called ThreeRings. All volunteers have their own unique log in details and can sign up for shifts from any computer, tablet or phone. It also means that the rota is dynamic, and everyone can see the shifts that need filling. We still struggle sometimes to cover shifts as not all volunteers serve at the till, so if you can help with an hour or two a week, please speak to Denise Howard or Terry Wolf and we'll arrange some initial training for you.

With some of the generous donations from bondholders, we have invested in a new sandwich/pie fridge - which is much more cost effective to run - and provides more space for all the delicious pies and sausage rolls from local firm Thorntons. Chris Scott from Unicorn Workshop has made the veg/fruit display for us on the forecourt and we are pleased with how much more fresh fruit and veg from Dooleys we can display – and customers are buying! If there is anything you need that we don't have, we can order daily from Dooleys. And our new plant shelving has worked a treat, with lots of plants, herbs and fruit bushes sold all summer. Autumn bedding will be next!

Easirockits

Easi-Rockits VX Club moved their Senior players' training to Huby Memorial Village Hall a few months ago. We are delighted with the venue; it lends itself to us practising our catching outside with our Crazycatches and the hall is much bigger than our previous venue.

For those of you wondering what VX is, I will try and explain: Players have a stick called a VStix which is a cylindrical tube with 'catchers' at either end. (See below). The scoop is used to pick up a low-impact tennis ball and the stick itself is used to throw the ball so that it hits an opponent. You also use it to defend yourself or you go home with a few bruises – and I know this from experience!

A proper game of VX has 5 players on each team and 5 balls in play so it is a fast paced game and the referee needs to have eyes in the back of her/his head. Having said that, players are expected to put up their hands when they are hit and wait until the ref tells them to play on. If you catch a ball from an opponent's VStix, you get 3 points. The team that has the fewest hits at the end of the 16 minutes wins.

It is a fantastic game for fitness, hand-eye co-ordination and also great fun. We have lots of different drips and adaptations of the game so if you fancy getting fit in what might seem to be an alternative way, do come along.

We run junior sessions for under 14s at Crayke from 6-7 but our seniors (over 14 but no upper limit) run at Huby from 7.30-9. It only costs £30 for annual membership (under 18s and students £25) plus £3 per week session fee. Your first session is free so come along and have a go.

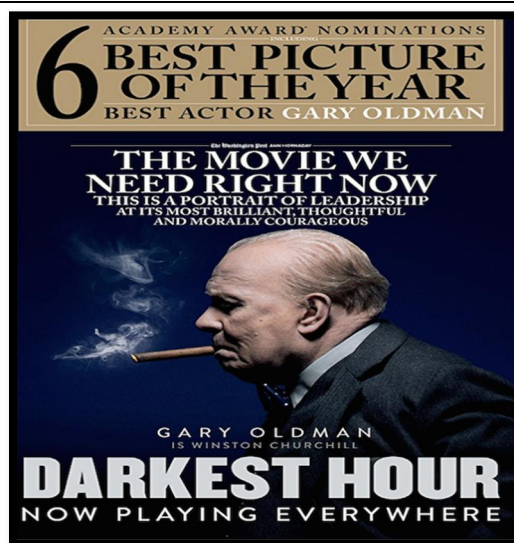

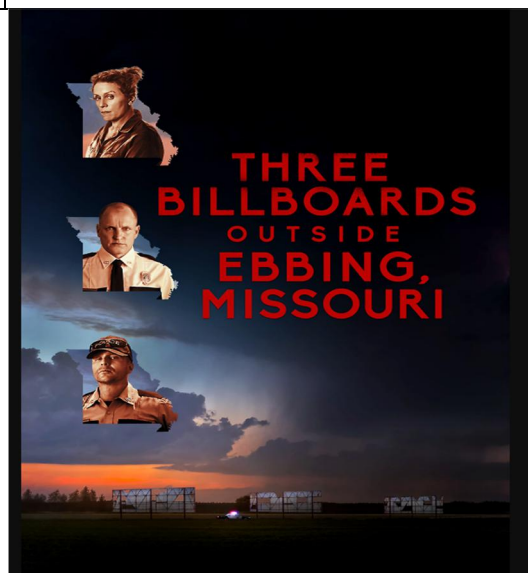

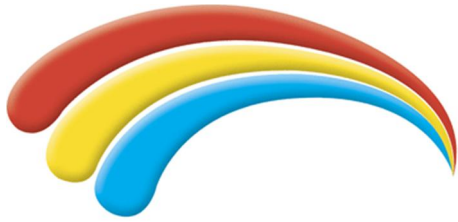

HUBY CHAPEL WAR MEMORIAL PLAQUE

Have you ever wondered about the five men with Huby connections who were killed in action in the First World War. They are commemorated on a plaque by the door of the chapel, but apart from their names, ranks and regiments there are no other details of these men. I have been curious to learn something about them: who they were, what they did before the war, how, when and where they died and whether they were buried in a war grave, how old they were, and what their family connections were. This is what I have found.

PRIVATE JAMES ARTHUR CUNDALL No 19728, 12th Battalion, West Yorkshire Regiment (Prince of Wales Own) He was killed in action in the battle of the Somme on 14th July 1916 aged 19. He has no War Grave but is commemorated on the THIEPVAL Memorial. Military records cite his rank as Private, and not Gunner as shown on the Memorial. James was born in Huby, and before enlisting was a farm lad at Alcar Farm in 1911. He had at least eleven brothers and sisters. He was the fourth child and second son of Thomas William and Annie Cundall of Huby. His father, a farm worker, originally came from Cawton, near Gilling, and his mother was born in Wheldrake. They moved to Huby sometime before 1901. James is the uncle of Alan Cundall who lives in Easingwold Road and his cousin the late Jim Cundall of Gracious Street.

LANCE CORPORAL WILLIAM HENRY HEBDON, No. 34503, 7th Battalion, Kings Own Yorkshire Light Infantry, He was killed in action in the Third Battle of Ypres on 23rd September 1917 aged 25. He has no War Grave but is commemorated on the TYNE COT Memorial. William was the son of Jonathan and Anna Hebdon of Huby. Originally from Easingwold, where the family was living in 1901, Jonathan was a pig dealer, and William was a joiner before enlisting. There are Hebdon families still living in the Easingwold area. I do not know of any actual relatives.

PRIVATE THOMAS WILLIAM HARDIMAN No 34912, 9th Battalion, Kings Own Yorkshire Light Infantry. (Formerly 5405, Yorkshire Regt.) He was killed in action in the Arras Offensive on 9th April 1917 aged 39. He has no War Grave, but is commemorated on the ARRAS Memorial in northern France. Thomas was not born in Huby. His parents were Joseph and Maria Hardiman of West End, Long Preston. An older man, Thomas was a gamekeeper at New Parks before the war.

PRIVATE GEORGE HAYDEN No 36079, 2nd Battalion, Yorkshire Regiment He was killed in action in the battle of the Somme on 13th October 1916 aged 20. He has no War Grave, but is commemorated on the THIEPVAL Memorial. George was a Farm Servant, born in Wigginton, the oldest of seven children of farm worker Jacob and Elizabeth Hayden all living in Sutton On The Forest in 1911. Can anyone tell me whether George Hayden was a relative of Jack Hayden who was living in Huby until the 1970s?

PRIVATE WILLIAM FRANK YORKE No 32454, 1st/5th Battalion, York & Lancaster Regiment He was killed in action during the German offensive at Ypres on 4th April 1918 aged 28. He has no War Grave but is commemorated on the TYNE COT Memorial. William was the eldest son of Thomas and Margaret Yorke of Novay Farm, Marton near Stillington. He was working on the farm in 1911, and his connection with Huby is not clear. Maybe he worked on a Huby farm after 1911, or maybe his mother, who was a Head Teacher in 1911 had connections with Huby School. I hope that these notes, taken from the Commonwealth War Graves Commission and the national censuses, will help to keep the memory of these men alive. No graves are recorded for any of them, which speaks volumes for the horrors they faced and the way in which they died.

Tom Dresser

"For most conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty near Roeux on the 12th May 1917. Private Dresser, in spite of being twice wounded on the way, and suffering great pain, succeeded in conveying an important message from Battalion Headquarters to the front line of trenches, which he eventually reached in an exhausted condition. His fearlessness and determination to deliver the message at any cost proved of the greatest value to his Battalion at a critical period." So reads the citation that won Tom Dresser the Victoria Cross. Tom Dresser V.C. was born at Laund House Farm, Huby, near Easingwold on 9th April 1891. The family moved several times, and sometime between 1902 and 1911 they moved to Middlesbrough. The Beck Isle Museum in Pickering holds several photographs and considerable research and documentation relating to Tom Dresser 'The Yorkshire V.C.'. Amongst the photographs in the possession of the museum is the one below, of Private Dresser wearing his VC. Aged 22, Tom enlisted on 8th February 1916 into the 6th Yorkshires, then transferred to the 5th Yorkshires. After 13 weeks at Rugeley training camp he sailed for France and arrived on the Somme with the 7th Yorkshires in early September 1916. 242697 Private Tom Dresser won his VC 242697 Private Tom Dresser won his VC near Roeux on 12th May 1917. It was gazetted on 27th June 1917. When he came out of hospital he was posted to the 74th Machine Gun Corps with a new number 138867 until he was demobilised on 27th April 1919. He returned to work at Dorman Long's Steel Works until he took over his father's new agency at 65 Marton Road, Middlesbrough. He lived above the shop with his wife, Theresa (nee Landers), whom he had married in 1924. They had four sons before Britain was again at war with Germany in 1939. During WW II, he served with 'G' Company, 8th North Riding (Middlesbrough) Battalion, Home Guard. He died on Good Friday, 9th April, 1982, three days after his 90th birthday and was buried in Thorntree Cemetery, Middlesbrough. His VC and medals are on loan to the Green Howards Regimental Museum in Richmond. Compiled by Bill Evers from Beck Isle Museum records and UK Census returns
