Parish News

The Parish Council power to meet online via Zoom has now expired. The next meeting which will be on Tuesday 5 July 2021 at 7.30pm in the village hall. It is not clear yet whether COVID secure arrangements will need to be made.

There is still just one vacancy on the Council. If anyone would like to be considered for co-option, please do email me.

Nine planning applications have been considered since the last newsletter. Damage to the verges in Main Street and Tollerton Road by contractors has been reported to Hambleton DC Planning Enforcement.

The County Council elections have again been postponed this time until next year and will very probably never take place due to the proposed introduction of a Unitary Authority.

The leaning tree at the corner of Gracious Street and Main Street had become a safety concern so has now been removed and a new red birch planted in its place.

The recent winter flooding has led to the arranging of a joint meeting between Yorkshire Water, North Yorkshire County Council Highways, Kyle & Upper Ouse Drainage Board and the Parish Council. More news about the outcome in the next newsletter.

A new larger notice board has been commissioned which will allow both Parish and community notices to be posted. The existing board will be found a new community use. The new board should be installed by the time you read this.

An informational sign was agreed for the entrance to Tally Hill. The Primary School have been invited to be involved in the design of the sign.

An assessment of the grit bins in the village has undertaken and any three new bins have been ordered from North Yorkshire County Council for next season.

The community speed camera group are now recruiting for new members and if you have an interest in joining them, please email me and I will pass on your details.

'2Ks WALK THE WALL' FOR ST LEONARDS HOSPICE

In 2020 we were supposed to walk 50Km of the 'Great Wall of China' and raise funds to support 'St Leonards Hospice', a charity very close to our hearts. Unfortunately, Covid came and like so many events this got postponed. We are hoping to try this again this October. Whether this goes ahead or not the hospice still needs the funds to continue to help support and care for those in need.

We started a few fund-raising events like a 'Gin evening' with our lovely village friends and 'Buy a square to win a Christmas Hamper' which Karen spent some time speaking to many in our local village shop in December 2019. We raised around £500 but our target is to raise £3000.

So from 1st May we have started another challenge to walk, run, row or cycle 500 miles over 5 weeks between us. Some of you may have already seen us out and about within the village. This will be part of our training for China, but also help to continue raising the profile of the Hospice and the amazing things that they do. So far, we have achieved 108 miles in Week1 and 111 miles in Week2. We have joined a walking group called 'Yorkie Talkies'.

On 9th May we walked Wainstones, Round Hill, Urr Moor & Cold Moor which was 10 miles with around 2500ft climbing and on 22nd May we are walking along the Nidderdale Way from Darley to Pateley Bridge which is 14 miles and 1600ft ascent.

HUBY WALKS GROUP

REGISTERING 3 RIGHTS-OF-WAY

Three rights-of-way were left off the Definitive Map of the parish, held by the County Council, in the 1950's.

So we, with the Parish Council, will be submitting a DMMO (Definitive Map Modification Order) to the County Council on the rights-of-way over Brownmoor Lane, Sparrington Lane and Oxclose Lane. This will determine whether or not these exist and to have a definitive result legally recognised.

The work on this has been delayed because of the pandemic but we can now move forward. The government has set a deadline of 2026 to all parishes to register rights-of-way, so we are now starting to collect information on Brownmoor Lane, followed by the other two lanes. These 3 lanes have been flagged up by the County Council as cases to be followed.

Please will you help us by filling in a form if you have used Brownmoor Lane over the last 20 years and more. The more use which can be demonstrated, the better the chance of registration. We also have to add historic maps and documents as evidence. Land owners down the lane will be contacted by the Parish Council.

Huby Walks Group will be giving out forms to anyone who needs one and they will also be available in the village shop. Completed forms can be returned to any of the team below.

HUBY PLAYING FIELDS ASSOCIATION UPDATE



Our planning application, very kindly paid for by Northmead Developments Ltd, has been reviewed and whilst no decision has been made yet, ongoing discussions with Hambleton District Council have been positive and we expect a decision within the next few weeks.

We are delighted to confirm that we have recently secured over £100,000 of funding through the incredibly generous support of local businessman Richard Todd, MD of Allium Energy as part of their community commitment. This is hugely important to us as a springboard to other funding, and as previously mentioned we now have over £150,000 pledged towards the total needed, so this will help enormously once we start applying for other funds. Many we have looked at require projects to have planning permission secured though, so we must wait a short while before starting this process.

Although still some time away, we are already thinking about potential user groups for the new facility, so would love to hear from anyone interested in setting up a club or society that would take advantage of the indoor and outdoor space available for activities like football, fitness classes, boot camps, summer sports camps, circuit training, park runs etc. No restrictions on age, ability, gender etc – all welcome.

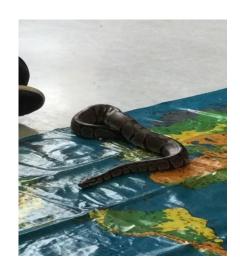

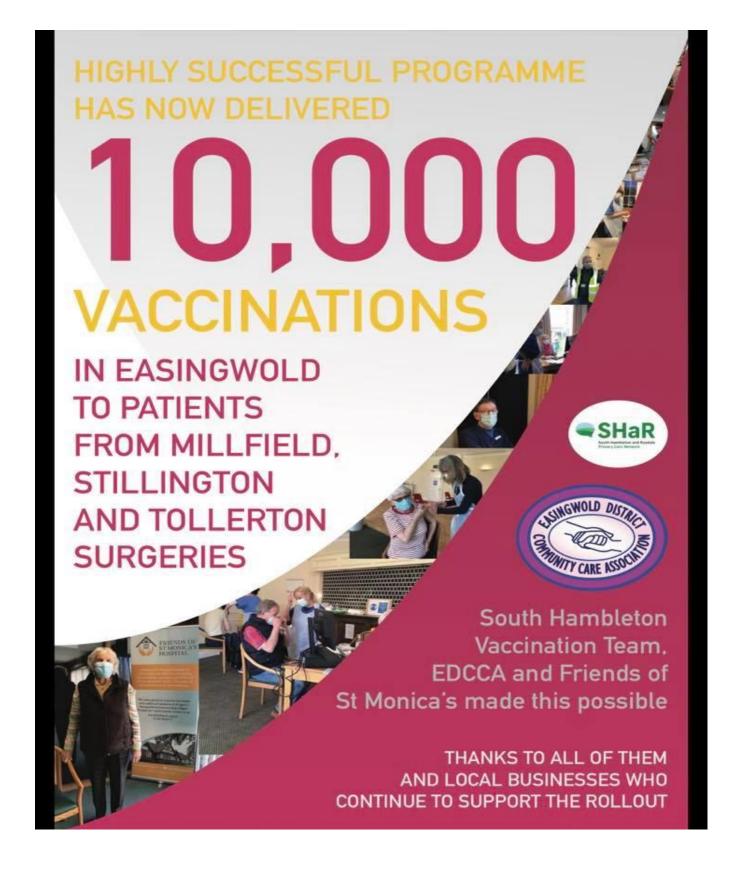
