The Council met on Wednesday 14 January 2026 and on Wednesday 11 March 2026.

Four planning applications were considered across both meetings.

An application by Huby Playing Fields Association to North Yorkshire Council for a Section 106 Grant was supported.

A site meeting took place with North Yorkshire Council to discuss the provision of a roundabout at Main Street / Tollerton Road at the request of a resident. This was considered by NYC Highways but would not be installed.

The request for yellow lines at the Main Street / Robin Lane junction was followed up with NYC Highways.

The next meeting is scheduled to be held on Wednesday 13 May 2026 at 7pm in the Village Hall.

Huby and Sutton Community Shop



Huby & Sutton Community Shop was officially presented with The King's Award for Voluntary Service on 26 February 2026 at a ceremony held in Huby Memorial Village Hall. His Majesty's Lord Lieutenant of North Yorkshire, Mrs Johanna Ropner, was joined by Deputy Lieutenant Rebecca Cotterall DL to present the award on behalf of His Majesty The King.



The King's Award for Voluntary Service is the highest honour given to volunteer-led organisations in the UK and is equivalent to an MBE. The award recognises the remarkable contribution made by the volunteers who run Huby & Sutton Community Shop, a Community Benefit Society owned by local residents and operated entirely for the benefit of the local community.



The shop provides essential services seven days a week, supports local suppliers and producers and offers opportunities for young people through the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme. Surpluses from the shop are reinvested and the shop intends to create a small grants fund to support local initiatives.

The ceremony was attended by former owner David Barker, representatives from the Parish Council, members of the Management Committee, volunteers and community shareholders. Co-Chairs Jan Garrill and Nigel Morgan thanked all the volunteers for their commitment and also expressed appreciation for everyone who supports the shop including its wonderful customers, noting that their continued loyalty is vital to the shop's success.

Co-Chair of the Huby & Sutton Community Shop Committee, Nigel Morgan, expressed gratitude on behalf of the team, saying "we are deeply honoured to receive The King's Award for Voluntary Service. This achievement belongs to every volunteer who gives their time so generously and to the community that supports us every day. We are incredibly proud of what we have built together."

Huby & Sutton Community Shop has become a focal point for our villages and those who live nearby, maintained by nearly 50 volunteers who give their time to serve customers, manage stock and support the daily running of the Post Office. It remains a place where people can connect and feel part of the community, reflecting the spirit of collaboration and care at the heart of village life.

Spring Term

Another term down for us here at Huby CofE Primary School and as always, we'd love to share some highlights with you from the past couple of months.



Over the last term, we've taken time to reflect on who we are and what we stand for by doing a spirituality audit and reviewing our vision and values. This process helped us reconnect with our purpose and make sure everything we do is aligned with it. Now, we're excited to launch a fresh new rebrand that brings all of this to life in a clearer, more meaningful way.

At our school, spirituality is understood as the ongoing journey of discovering who we are, what matters to us, and how we belong in the world. It is found in moments of delight, curiosity and wonder – in being fully present and absorbed in the richness of life and learning. We nurture each person's sense of identity and self-worth, encouraging personal insight, reflection, and a quest for a fulfilled and flourishing life.

Spirituality also grows through our relationships with others, as we learn to care, connect and recognise our place in a wider world.

We strive to ensure that pupils at Huby are happy and confident individuals who demonstrate the school's core Christian values of CURIOSITY (inspiring us to explore and delight in the world), CONNECTION (helping us to understand ourselves and others), and COURAGE (enabling us to grow, reflect and flourish).

Last term, our team of student librarians held a bake sale to raise funds for new library books. The student librarians dedicate a lot of time and commitment to the school library and are passionate about supporting pupils in finding books they will love.

As a result of the bake sale, a number of librarian representatives headed to The Blue House Bookshop in York, where they chose 17 new books, covering all school age ranges to add to the library collection.

The Blue House Bookshop will have held a pop-up book store in school, by the time of publication, giving our pupils the opportunity to browse and purchase new books, without having the journey into York.



On Wednesdays, we use Picture News as a framework for collective worship, with some of our older pupils taking it in turns to deliver the session. It is a carefully structured way to approach what is happening in the world around us and gives our children the opportunity to consider and discuss this.

There is also a newsletter provided to parents which offers useful support when it comes to discussing tricky topics at home. Over the last half term, topics such as a school in Wales removing skirts as a uniform option and whether school uniforms should be the same for everyone, humanised robots dancing for China's Lunar New Year and how might robots change our daily lives and the Bank of England's decision to include wildlife on future banknotes and what should represent a country have been discussed.

For World Book Day this year, our older pupils took time out of the day to read books to our youngest pupils in Nursery and Reception, as well as creating homemade games to play with them. In classrooms there were also lots of special World Book Day activities, continuing to encourage a love of reading.

We had children from a number of classes attend the county cross country competition in Thirsk. The talent we have for running across the school is exemplary, and we are always hugely proud to see our students representing the school so well, at such a high level.



Finally, we had our Easter Service at All Hallows Church in Sutton. Not only did we have our usual fantastic singing and storytelling for parents, but this time we also included our musicians from across the school.

Every Tuesday, many of our pupils have music lessons in school, from cornet to clarinet and guitar, and those, along with others who have private lessons outside of school, took on the very brave challenge of performing solo pieces at our service. They all did a fantastic job.

Pavillion Project Update - May 2026



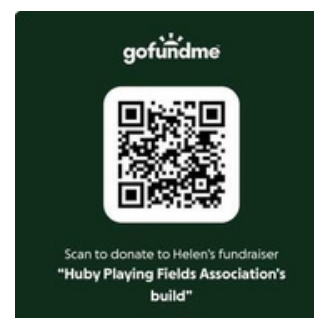
I'm delighted to report that we have been successful with both of our recent grant applications, and consequently we will be able to start Phase 2 of our project – the internal fit out of the new pavilion – with immediate effect.

Planning is underway to deploy the funds carefully to ensure best value and have as much of the necessary infrastructure behind the scenes completed before we can start the more visible elements later in the year.

Both applications involved detailed submissions about our ambitions for the pavilion as an activity hub for local sports clubs as well as the wider community. We are grateful for the support of North Yorkshire Sport in assisting us through their process, and the involvement of investment from David Skaith, Mayor of York and North Yorkshire, funded by York and North Yorkshire Combined Authority, and delivered by North Yorkshire Sport.

In addition, the Football Foundation have also been very generous in their support of our project and were equally supportive of our application throughout the process. The growth in recent years, and plans for future development of the Huby Corinthians JFC in the Village went a long way to helping secure this funding, so a big thank you is due to all the committee, coaches, volunteers and supporters of the teams who have contributed to this success.

We are continuing to explore several other funding opportunities to help us reach our final target, and the grants recently received will provide a good platform for us to demonstrate the viability of our project, and whilst our motivation to finish has never wavered, this is a real boost in our quest to complete it.

The church is open every day from 9.00am to late afternoon.

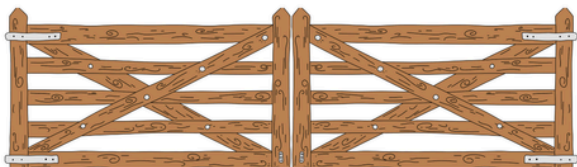

There will be lunch in Sutton Village Hall from 12 noon -1pm, and tea & cake from 2pm - 5pm.

This is all in a good cause as we support different organisations each time. This year we have chosen The Alzheimer's Society and St Leonards Hospice.

There will be 9 open gardens in Sutton-on-the-Forest this time, including Sutton Park and several new gardens. We are very grateful to all of them for allowing us to wander through their own Shangri-La, as we borrow ideas along the way.

There will also be a Plant Stall (with proceeds to the Gardening Club), sale of Yorkshire Pots (as used by Monty Don), Brass Band on the Sunday, Folk Singer on the Monday, and Stained Glass demonstration in All Hallows Church on both days.

Of course this does not happen by magic, and I must thank all of our club members who are taking cuttings, dividing perennials, sowing seeds and making sure that all plants are labelled (we cannot always identify a green shoot in a pot). If you have any plants for sale, we will be very grateful. Please contact the club if you want to know where to leave them. I also have to thank everyone who helps us to set up the marquees, gazebos, tables and chairs and puts them all away at the end. The Story of Huby Village Hall

In The Beginning:

Once upon a time there was nowhere for Huby people to gather, except the Reading Room, which is now the shop, and the old school, now Old School House, occasionally.

During the Second World War fund-raising concerts for organisations like Wings for Victory, took place in the old school. Roy Muir was part of the village fund raising at that time. He had the idea to form a Dramatic Society. This met in the old school but soon he realised that they needed somewhere to put shows on.

Roy and friends fund raised and got interest-free loans from business people, which were paid off as soon as possible. They raised enough to buy some land on which to build a village hall. A derelict cottage in Main Street, called Rose Cottage, formerly occupied by Ann Slater, was bought from Thelma Russell, her daughter, for £275 in 1946. The hall itself was originally part of Linton-on-Ouse Aerodrome School, the RAF school, which had been in a fire. The group bought the untouched parts to become the main village hall. A second section was later added as the annex. The 3 trustees for the hall were Henry Mills of Spring House Farm, Harry Piercy of Follifoot and Adela Shaw of Burn Hall.

The erection of the new hall was all done voluntarily by Huby people, after work, and at the weekends. The later addition of the cloakrooms and porch at the front was built by Thomas Howell and Sons, and paid for with a 'buy a brick' scheme. The original floor of the section of Linton RAF school was replaced by an expensive Canadian maple floor, a proper dance floor. It was probably the only village hall in the North of England with a real dance floor. It seemed obvious, therefore, to raise money after the hall was opened in 1950, by holding dances. Coaches would bring people out from York to Saturday night dances. Roy remembers one of the best nights when three coach loads came out from York, and started to cause trouble. Bill Cox, the policeman, was on duty, and he told the bus drivers to go back to York and let the trouble makers walk home! The money raised was used to pay off loans. Dances were still being held until the 1970's - we remember them well, as committee members used to volunteer as bouncers to stop trouble by youths from other villages.

Roy and Norman Darnley built the stage - there is still a piece of wood under there with their name on it!

The Amateur Dramatic Society put on variety shows, plays, comedies and took the shows all over Yorkshire to places like Filey, Boroughbridge, Scotch Corner and Selby. Pantomimes came in relatively late, in the 1970's.

The first chairman of the hall was Mr Ayres, who had the shop next to the Reading Room, one of the pair of cottages still there today. Also on the first committee were Harry Severs, Harry Piercy and Henry Mills and Eddie Oliver. A village hall constitution was written. The new hall was named Huby Memorial Village Hall to commemorate all who died in the war, but particularly two Huby men, John Eagle, from near the Star Inn, and Frank Spruce, from Croft Cottages.

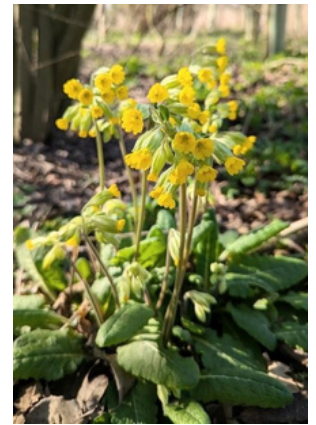
Spring at the Forest of Flowers, Huby

Spring has well and truly sprung here at our woodland and meadows, with wildflowers blooming, bees buzzing and birds singing! It's always exciting to watch the site come to life at this time of year.

Cowslips (pictured) have come out in droves, making the whole place so much more colourful. Bluebells, red campion and blackthorn blossom are all doing their bit too!

Butterfly monitoring season has begun, with our weekly surveys already showing good numbers and a range of species. Peacock, Orange Tip and Brimstone have all done well so far this spring.

We have also had new arrivals in the form of two lovely goat kids! Our small herd gives us lots of lovely milk and cheese, helping us to be more self-sufficient. (And having newborns to play with occasionally is an added bonus!)



Tansy Beetle's Return



Last year we introduced the endangered Tansy Beetle to our site, with the hope of establishing a satellite population away from the River Ouse, protecting the species in the event of a flood. They had their ups and downs last year, not helped by the very dry weather which impacted their second brood significantly.

They ended 2025 with very few numbers, so we weren't sure what to expect this spring, but thankfully the next generation emerged! Hopefully the start of a good year ahead.

Tuesday 19 May: Dead of Winter

After her husband's death, widow Barb sets out to fulfil his last request to have his ashes scattered in Lake Hilda in northern Minnesota. When Barb reaches the lake, she sees Leah, a young woman with her hands bound trying to escape from her abductor.

Director Brian Kirk gives Emma Thompson an inspired opportunity to play a completely different kind of role. You've never seen her like this, grungy in working overalls grappling over a rifle in the middle of a frozen lake. But all the craft and presence you'd expect from the two-time Oscar winner are on display, as always. She's often alone on screen and much of the performance is wordless, but because she's Emma Thompson, she always holds our attention with warmth and wisdom. Roger Ebert



Tuesday 23 June: H is for Hawk

In the wake of her father's sudden death in 2007, the English academic Helen Macdonald turned to training a goshawk, attempting to stave off depression by subsuming her grief in a relationship with a bird of prey - not just any bird but one considered notoriously difficult to train, even for trained falconers. But the goshawk's fierce, unpredictable nature spoke to something wild in Macdonald's own temperament, to her impulsive and perhaps self-destructive desire to withdraw from civilization, taking solace in the natural world.

Claire Foy, best known for playing a young Queen Elizabeth in the "The Crown," is heartbreaking in this adaptation's main role: steely and stoic in the stiff-upper-lip tradition yet thoroughly conscious of her sorrow, which smarts beneath all the poised expressions like the inner wound it is.

Jessie Buckley, Paul Mescal and Chloé Zhao capture just how art channels our emotions in a mystical period drama about a death in the Shakespeare family. Chloé Zhao's wrenching adaptation of the bestselling 2020 novel by Maggie O'Farrell has been described as being about how Shakespeare wrote Hamlet after his young son, Hamnet, died. While technically accurate, that misses the exact mechanics of Zhao's immersive account of the desire, grief, love and anger that course between a woman and her playwright husband, culminating in a remarkable demonstration of what art can do.
